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Multiple Birth Awareness Week 2020

International Multiple Birth Awareness Week (IMBAW) 2020 will take place from 9th-15th November. The theme for this year is 'Building a Global Community: Championing the rights of multiples'. This theme fits nicely with talking about evolution of ICOMBO and the development and promotion of the declaration of rights. Even though we had no idea when we chose the theme of building a global community, it fits well with the Covid-19 situation. There are many ways that our member organisations have built communities this year in slightly different ways than normal. It will be great to share these stories.

At the 1992 ISTS Congress in Japan, multiple-birth organisations worked together to begin compiling a Declaration of Rights and Statement of Needs for Twins and Higher Order Multiples. This declaration was formally adopted at the 1995 ISTS Congress, held in Richmond, VA. We have recently updated the declaration to modernise it and bring it in line with recent research and thinking. The changes are being reviewed by Jeff Craig (lecturer at Deakin University and President of the International Society for Twin Studies), Mark Umstad (a highly experienced Obstetrician with a strong interest in high-risk obstetrics, particularly multiple pregnancies) and Jane Denton (Director at The Multiple Births Foundation). The next step is to update the references. This updated declaration will be promoted during International Multiple Birth Awareness Week (IMBAW) to raise awareness of the issues it covers.

There are seven rights so each day during IMBAW we will focus on one of these:

- Freedom from discrimination of any kind
- Full information around fertility treatment and chances of multiples
- ♦ Zygosity
- Research with multiples
- Appropriate care
- Importance of the twin bond
- Recognition of individuality

Let's Celebrate 40 Years of ICOMBO!

Did you know this year we celebrate 40 years of The International Council of Multiple Birth Organisations (ICOMBO)?

ICOMBO (formerly COMBO) was formed at the 1980 ISTS Congress, held in Jerusalem. Between 1980 to 1986 international liaison between COMBO members developed including exchange of newsletters, resources, and



research. A new management structure for COMBO was approved at the 1998 Congress in Helsinki, and COMBO was ratified as a working group of International Society for Twin Studies (ISTS). During the 2010 Congress in Seoul Korea, COMBO formally changed their name to the International Council of Multiple Birth Organisations (ICOMBO) to better reflect their global reach.

We are considering how we will mark this milestone. This could be a virtual event or some sort of activity during International Multiple Birth Awareness Week (IMBAW).

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School Placement Survey/Study - July Release

SCHOOL PLACEMENT STUDY



Our Director of Research, Dr Susan Griffith, has completed the write-up of the report on our school placement study. The report will be released in a **special edition** of the newsletter; therefore, keep your eyes peeled for a very informative July Newsletter. We are very excited to share the results of this survey which had participation from around the Globe.

As schools begin to reopen for the next term, parents will have timely information as they makes decisions on school placement. This is going to be a great resource to pass on to your local chapters as school placement is a hot topic that continues to be high on the minds of our multiple birth community.

Here is a little snippet from the report:

The report is the result of a survey that was conducted in 2018/19. It was available in English, French and Spanish. Parents whose multiples were 3 years of age or older were invited to participate. A total of 2,842 parents of multiples completed the survey. The respondents were from over 18 countries. More than half of the surveyed parents asked for their multiples to be placed together in the classroom at some point in their school years. Many parents recognised a need to separate their multiples and over 40% asked for their multiples to be separated in the classroom at some point in their school years. No decision should be binding, as the need to separate or not may change over time.

RESOURCES ON SCHOOL PLACEMENT OF MULTIPLES REQUEST FOR ASSISTANCE

When making decisions about school placement, parents often look for resources to assist their decision making. Over half of the parents who responded to the survey were not aware that there are books and other publications available that may be valuable to them. And in one country, there are Twin Laws in various parts of the country that support parents in having an active role in the placement decision that survey participants were not aware of.

ICOMBO wants to gather resource materials and make them readily available. We are preparing a document that lists the various resources (books, publications, websites etc) that can assist parents when making decisions on classroom placements.

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ICOMBO Surveys...The Process

As we get ready to release the School Placement Survey next month, we thought it would be interesting to share the process and work tasks which we follow in producing an ICOMBO survey:

First, we need to come up with a timely topic.

The last three big ICOMBO surveys, our current one on School Placement, Single Parents of Multiples and Post-Partum Mood Disorder (PPMD) in Mothers of Multiples, came from ICOMBO members brainstorming for pertinent topics at ICOMBO sessions during ISTS Congresses. The last survey prior to the School Placement survey was the Multiples in Research, which was also decided upon at Congress.

• To start a survey, we need to gather survey questions.

Usually one person is assigned the lead role to kick things off, then several ICOMBO members write pertinent questions, and the ideas are bounced around in the group. Once the first draft is made, more input is asked for and after several drafts, the hopefully final version goes before the entire ICOMBO Board.

• Once we are nearing the final survey, often the survey is sent not only to the ICOMBO Board for review/suggestions, but also to experts in the field.

For example, Carolyn Lister sent draft questions for the Multiples in Research survey to several people in the twin research field, e.g. Jeff Craig and others.

• We then look to ICOMBO members for volunteers to translate the survey into other languages. Marion Gevers and Lucila Menendez, along with others are quick to assist in this effort.

The most recent survey was translated from English to French and Spanish. The PPMD survey was translated from English to Czech and French. And the Single Parent study was translated from English to Czech, Danish, French, German, Japanese and Spanish. Carolyn Lister has also used Marion and some local club members to translate a survey from English to Arabic, French, German, Japanese and Spanish. It all hinges on who volunteers.

• For the last ten years, we have primarily used Multiple of America's Survey Monkey site to distribute the surveys.

This is supplemented with a lot of advertising on Facebook, within our organisations, and at annual organisation meetings.

• We generally set up a 6 month deadline to complete a survey.

However, sometimes we extend the time if we feel we don't have enough subjects who have completed the survey. The Research VP for ICOMBO, a position I have held for the past several Congresses, generally does the interpretations. Also, as a Multiples of America national worker, I was given access to their Survey Monkey site for our surveys. When the review is near completion, it is sent to the other ICOMBO Board members for their approval. Carolyn Lister has also used the Multiples New Zealand survey account for the recent Multiples in Research survey and also for a smaller research survey previously completed.

• Once the final paper is complete, we have generally presented it at the next Congress.

This has worked well in the past because the Congresses are generally every 2-3 years therefore, it gives us enough time to write up the survey questions, distribute the surveys and analyze the results. However, with the November 2019 and July 2020 Congresses in Beijing being cancelled because of the COVID-19 pandemic, we feel we should go ahead and release the survey results of the **School Placement of Multiples survey** to our members and to the public. This will be done in July 2020. We will then look to ICOMBO member Carolyn Lister to write-up the Multiples in Research survey as a scientific paper and hopefully present it at the next Congress in 2021.

I look forward to releasing the results of the ICOMBO School Placement of Multiples next month.
